## DREW'S BIRDS OF THE MONTH

Carolina and Black-capped chickadees hybridize in the area where their ranges overlap, but the two species probably diverged more than 2.5 million years ago. The Carolina's territory is generally in the Southeastern U.S. while the Black-capped is primarily found in the northern half of America. Chickadees are one of the easiest birds to attract to feeders, for suet, sunflower, and peanuts. About half of their diet consists of animal matter insects/spiders and half is plant matter seeds/berries. Both species may be found in deciduous and mixed deciduous-coniferous woodlands, swamps, riparian areas, open woods and parks, and also in suburban and urban areas. They are box nesters, having only one brood a year consisting of 3 -11 white with brown speckled eggs. (Please see page 3 for details.)

## President's Musings

*I* recently read a very interesting article in *Scientific America* titled "Fate of The Hybrid Chickadee" by Rebecca Heisman. The article dealt with the hybridization of the Black-capped Chickadee and the Carolina Chickadee in areas where their ranges overlap called the "hybrid zone." Usually in the Animal

Kingdom, when members of the same species mate and produce offspring, the offspring is normal individuals, and can reproduce and function with some of the same traits as their parents. Cases in point are some of the warblers, for example: the Blue-winged Warbler X Golden-winged Warbler producing a Brewster's Warbler in the first generation, and a backcross with one of the parent species to produce a Lawrence's Warbler. Mallards have also been known to mate with over 40 other species of ducks – good luck with identification!

Just as a sideline to the article and to put some perspective in this musing, our club went on a bird walk to Fenwick mines with Bill Hunley as our guide. Bill astutely pointed out as we walked that we were in a "hybrid zone" for the Black-capped Chickadee and the Carolina Chickadee. Rather than try to identify a hybrid, we would just use Chickadee species, which covers all three.

The article goes on to report that in the 1990s ornithologists began to realize through repeated surveys by bird watchers that the hybrid zone was moving. It was then that Robert Curry, an ornithologist and behavioral ecologist at Villanova University, embarked on a study of hybrid chickadees. He set up three field sites in Ohio, Pennsylvania, and New Jersey (Virginia wasn't included). He found while studying the hybrid offspring of both chickadee species that the hatching rate per nest decreased, and in many cases only one egg out of eight in the nest hatched.

Curry then enlisted the help of postdoctoral researcher Scott Taylor at Cornell University, who used the analysis from the eBird platform to determine that the chickadee hybrid zone was indeed moving due to climate change with warmer winters slowly moving north.

The question remains – Will hybrid bird species be able to adapt to the increasing temperature changes moving north?

Size & Shape	A small (avg. 5.25" long), acrobatic bird with longer tail and (to some observers) a proportionately larger head.	The smallest (avg. 4.75" long) North American chickadee with a proportionately smaller head and shorter tail.
Wing Coverts	In fresh plumage (in the autumn and early spring) the greater wing coverts and secondaries are broadly edged in white, forming what appears to be a long white patch.	The greater wing coverts are more uniformly grey and show less white, lending a plainer look to the upper parts.
Sides of Nape	Mostly white on sides of nape.	Mostly greyish on sides of nape.
Bib	The lower edge of the black bib is generally less defined than on a Carolina Chickadee and appears uneven.	The bib is generally smaller, although there is some individual variation in bib size in both species. There is also a neat line of separation between the bib and belly, although this character may be obscured in very worn birds (especially in summer).
Buffy Sides	Noticeable buffy coloration under the wings	The cinnamon-buff coloring under the wings is less developed on the Carolina Chickadee (but fresh adults in the northeast part of its range show brighter cinnamon and can be confused with Black- capped).
Tail	The outer tail feathers are more broadly edged with white.	Less white on outer tail feathers. Sometimes the tail may appear completely gray.

Go about 4 miles and turn left at the entrance to the Greenfield Education and Training Center, across from the entrance to Ashley Plantation. Park in the second lot on right.

29 Sunday at the Sewage Treatment Plant, 9:00 am. (Note: Winter start time change.) Leaders: Kent Davis (540-353-4500) and Kirk Gardner (828-216-9170). Where else would you rather be during the Holidays? Join us for a walk around the Sewage Treatment Plant. The entrance to the STP is by special permit and trip participants must all enter at the same time and stay together with our leaders. This site is one of the best spots for viewing shorebirds in the Roanoke Valley. The property includes impoundments, sludge ponds, mudflats, riparian habitat and woodlands. Besides shorebirds, we can expect to see resident hawks and possibly ravens and fish crows. The walking is mostly flat with a short steep trail. Sturdy waterproof boots are recommended as it often is muddy.

**Directions:** Meet at the Greenway parking lot off of Bennington Street near the bridge over the Roanoke River; the entrance to the parking area is between the bridge and Brownlee Avenue. Note that Thirteenth Street SE changes names to Bennington Street at the bridge over the Roanoke River. After the group has gathered, we will caravan or walk the short distance to the STP, so please arrive minutes early.


