ALL ABOUT THE VIRGINIA MASTER NATURALIST PROGRAM

Many of us have heard of the Master Naturalist Program, but have questions. What is the program all about? What is involved to becoming one? What will I learn? What does a Master Naturalist do? At our October meeting, Donna Haley, President of the Roanoke Chapter of Virginia Master Naturalists, will explain the program to us. The program covers areas such as Biogeography, Geology and Soil Science, Entomology, Ornithology, Aquatic and Forest Ecology, Herpetology, Ichthyology and Dendrology.

Donna Haley began her service to Virginia Cooperative Extension in 1996 as a Master Gardener. In 2012, she took on the title of Master Naturalist as well. Donna, as an ethno-botanist, taught horticulture at Virginia Western Community College at Greenfield. She is a "Tank Team" member at the Ocean in the Mountains Aquarium at Center in the Square in Roanoke. She also enjoys volunteering for the Blue Ridge Mountains Council Boy Scouts of America and serves on their Council Conservation Committee. She is a long time geocacher, and a recent presenter at the Virginia Environmental Educators Conference. She is a 2015 Citizens for Clean and Green, City of Roanoke Green Academy graduate. Donna is an active member in Botetourt County, where she resides with her husband Dan, and two teenage sons, Kyle and Kevin.


Bird Club at the GO FEST 2018 October 12, 13,14

The Feather Thief: Beauty, Obsession, and the Natural History Heist of the Century

Edwin Rist was training to become a professional flautist at London's Royal Academy of Music. In 2009, under the cover of darkness he broke into the British Natural History Museum at Tring. And he stole almost 300 priceless and irreplaceable bird skins, many collected by famous naturalist.

Johnson investigates and seeks to uncover the strange obsession that led Rist to swipe these feathers and the seedy undercover network of fly-tying. It's a fascinating book that touches on many interests including natural history and ornithology. I've even added visiting Tring to my bucket list.

October 10th, Wednesday, 8AM

Second Wednesday Bird Walk at Greenfield

Join Barry Whitt (309-4353) for a bird walk on the Cherry Blossom Trail at Greenfield. We will walk around Greenfield Lake in search for waterfowl and song-birds. The walk will be mostly flat walking for about 1 mile. Other walking at the property may include the grassy area overlooking the lake or the trail down to the lower pond. Bring your spotting scopes! Some folks may want to visit Ballast Point brewery at 11AM for lunch after the walk. They have a veranda that overlooks the lake.

Directions: Take Exit 150B on I81 and follow signs to Route 220N. Go about 4 miles and take a left at the entrance to the Greenfield Education and Training Center, across from the entrance to Ashley Plantation. Park in the second lot on the right.

October 13th, Saturday, 7:30AM

Birding at Beaver Pond

Meet Eunice Hudgins (389-4056) and Linda Cory (580-5214) at the Orange Market at Hanging Rock at 7:30AM to carpool to George and Betsy Barker's "Beaver Pond" in Craig County. Wear sturdy shoes, warm clothes and bring a packed lunch/drink. You can choose to walk around the farm and woods area or do some porch birding overlooking the Barker's many feeders. This property includes a beaver pond, wetland area, open pastures as well as woodland trails. In the past, we have been treated to Rose-breasted Grosbeak, a resident albino Red-Tailed Hawk, Snipe and several butterfly species.

Directions: The Hanging Rock Orange Market is at 1823 Thompson Memorial Drive, Roanoke (just off of I-81 at either Exits 140 or 141).

October 27th, Saturday, 8:00AM

Fenwick Mines

Meet Educator Bill Hunley (467-3477) at the Orange Market in Hanging Rock at 8:00 a.m. to carpool to Fenwick Mines and surrounds. A favorite of the Roanoke Valley Bird Club, this trip covers a wide range of habitats in a relatively small area. This includes open fields, a small pond, wetlands, a mountain stream and mixed pine and hardwood forests. The Fenwick Nature Trail is one mile of easy walking. We will look for a variety of birds and hope for Red Crossbills which have been spotted there in years past.

Directions: The Hanging Rock Orange Market is at 1823 Thompson Memorial Drive, Roanoke (just off of I-81 at either Exits 140 or 141).

November 3, Saturday, 8:00AM

Waid Park

Meet President Kent Davis (355-6388) at the park entrance for an easy to moderate walk through the park. The park covers 512 acres with a variety of habitat from woodland species to waterfowl. We will be exploring the nature trails and wetland areas surrounding the Pigg River. Wear sturdy, waterproof shoes for possible wet terrain. We should conclude before noon, but there are picnic table if you choose to bring a packed lunch.

Directions: From Roanoke at Tanglewood Mall, take 220 South and travel 18.5 miles and take the first Rocky Mount exit. Merge onto Business 220, AKA Main St. Go 2 miles and take a right onto 40 going west, AKA Franklin Street. You will zigzag through Rocky Mount, staying on Route 40 West, toward Ferrum. About 2 miles past “The Harvester Music Center”, take a right onto Six Mile Post Road at the “40 West Food Fare”. In 1.75 miles, take a left onto Waid Park Road. Continue straight passing a small parking lot on the left. Shortly after that, take a left into the huge parking lot and park at the top right of the lot where you will meet your leader, Kent Davis. The address is 701 Waid Park Road, Rocky Mount, VA.

FIELD TRIPS REPORTS

September 1st Night Hawk Watch on Bent Mountain - Night hawks are one of our most favorite migrators, but only one was seen on this field trip. On the same night, 65 were reported in town. Since then, they are still being seen on Bent Mountain, so it is worth a second look. Other species seen on the walk were eastern meadowlark, rose-breasted grosbeak, red-winged blackbird, common raven and chimney swifts.

September 12th Second Wednesday Walk at Greenfield - In spite of it being a misty day, our group spotted 37 species including wood duck, spotted sandpiper, yellow-billed cuckoo, kestrels, Acadian flycatcher, warbling vireo, brown thrasher and a kingfisher.

Eastern Bluebirds (Sialia sialis) are well known in the United States for their brilliant plumage, sweet song, and use of nestboxes. It is hard to imagine that this species nearly went extinct in the early 1900s because of a deadly combination of management practices that removed the dead tree snags that bluebirds depend upon for nesting, the introduction of exotic species that competed for nesting cavities, and the detrimental effects of pesticides. The recovery of populations across the eastern United States is an example of how everyday citizens can play a role in conservation. The major factor in the bluebird's recovery was the establishment of nestboxes by private landowners across their range.

There will be a small supply of extra seed available the day of the sale for those unable to pre-order. Refreshments will be served, 2019 calendars with photos taken by club members will be on sale, bluebird houses and gently used bird feeders will also be available for purchase, and experienced birders will be on hand to answer questions.

Orders must be received by October 15 and picked up on Saturday, November 10, between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m., at:

Seed Descriptions

Wild birdseed mixes attract ground-feeding birds such as mourning doves, juncos and sparrows:

- *Gourmet Mix*: contains millet, sunflower, safflower and thistle.

Sunflower seed is the best all-around food, favored by a wide variety of birds:

- *Black Oil Sunflower*: smaller than the striped, with thinner shell, more kernel and higher oil content; preferred 2:1 over other seed by most feeder birds.
- *Sunflower Chips*: the heart of the seed, virtually no hull, no mess, and more meat per pound.
- *Striped Sunflower*: many common feeder birds, such as cardinals, jays, grosbeaks, titmice, chickadees, sparrows and finches, as well as squirrels, like this larger, thicker shelled seed.

Specialty feed:

- *Nyjer (Thistle)*: especially good for goldfinches and pine siskins, this seed is rich in nourishing oil.
- *White Millet*: favored by ground feeding birds such as juncos, towhees, buntings and sparrows.
- *Safflower*: most squirrels don't care for it, but many birds such as cardinals, grosbeaks and juncos do.
- *Peanuts*: a favorite of woodpeckers, titmice, chickadees, nuthatches and blue jays.
- *Corn*: keep the squirrels busy with corn on the cob to keep them away from your feeders.
- *Suet*: the high fat content helps birds stay warm in the winter.
