### February 19, Backyard Birding

---

Sixteen birders came out for this event at Carol Whiteside's home in SW Roanoke County off Cotton Hill Rd. Some birded from indoors, watching Carol's many feeders while others walked the grounds. 16 species were seen. Highlights included: brown creeper, yellow bellied sapsucker, white-breasted nuthatch, pine siskin, and red tailed hawk. After everyone left, Carol spotted a flock of turkeys. Thanks to Carol for her hospitality.

### Feb. 26th, Duck Walk

---

Eighteen birders, led by Tim and Alyce Quinn, enjoyed a sunny but brisk morning of birding Murray's Pond (Waterfall Lake), Greenfields and Steven's Road Pond.

They saw the following: ring-billed gull, house sparrow, black vulture, turkey vulture, American crow, gadwall, Canada goose, coot, ring-necked duck, mallard, Carolina wren, green-winged teal, white-breasted nuthatch, eastern bluebird, northern mockingbird, house finch, northern flicker, yellow-bellied sapsucker, northern harrier, mourning dove, blue jay, grackle, song sparrow, snipe, bufflehead, hooded merganser, red-winged blackbird, red-tailed hawk, kingfisher, canvasback, ruddy duck, American robin, downy woodpecker, hairy woodpecker, great blue heron, white-crowned sparrow, northern cardinal, mute swan and the best bird of the day, a loggerhead shrike!!

### VSO Outer Banks Field Trip – Feb. 11-13

---

Thousands and thousands of northern gannets traded back and forth just off the beaches on Saturday to the delight of those attending the trip. There were 134 bird species tallied during the weekend, some of which were: "Ipswich" savannah sparrow, red-throated loon, sora, northern shoveler, northern pintail, green-winged teal, American avocet, northern saw-whet owl (heard) and great-horned owl (heard), American woodcock, Wilson's snipe, American pipit, Swainson's hawk, northern harrier, American kestrel, bald eagle, red-tailed hawk, merlin, red-shouldered hawk, and sharp-shinned hawk.

## JAMES L. AYERS

---

Jim, 74, a past president of The Roanoke Valley Bird Club and field trip coordinator for several years, died on February 2, 2011.

"He was not a birder when I showed him a gray-cheeked thrush at North Creek in 1972" says Barry Kinzie.

"When Jim moved to Daleville about 1975, I taught him to bird. He was very smart with a high IQ and he learned quickly. I was with him for the second golden eagle ever observed at Harvey's Knob about 1977 and I was with him for the last Bewick's wren ever ID'd in the Roanoke Valley at Daleville Pond in 1978. He spent a lot of hours at Harvey's Knob. That's good for anybody."

"I miss Jim greatly," commented Linda Cory. "He was my birding mentor and invited me to join him on various bird finding missions. We looked for winter wrens (one of his favorites), warblers on Warbler Road and Chuck Will's widows in Botetourt County. On one of our last forays, he took me along to 'be his ears' to find blue-winged warblers. We were successful!"

Those of us who birded with Jim over the years know that he took his hobby very seriously but made it a fun learning experience for new birders. "How to Get There," "Some Ways to Remember Bird Songs and Calls," "Targeted Times of Arrival of Non-wintering Birds (Breeders and Migrants) to The Roanoke/Botetourt Area," and "Identification of Eastern Wood Warblers" were all written by Jim and are still valuable information tools used today.

Having previously birded in Costa Rica and Guatemala, in February of 1994, Jim, along with Mike Smith and two others traveled to Honduras. Adventures of this trip are recorded in his book, "Birding in Honduras: 1994," which is really interesting and fun to read.

Jim was very knowledgeable, funny and at times a little grumpy if things were not going his way. I'm sure a lot of us have birding stories about Jim. Our favorite was the time we were birding Solitude on Big Spring Day and locked ourselves out of the car. We bent a piece of rusty wire and tried, in vain, to open the door. After wringing our hands and watching Jim become really grumpy, John picked up a rather large rock and handed it to Jim. With a firm thrust he broke the window tossing glass all over the interior of the car. Jim opened the door, brushed the glass off the seats, climbed in and cheerfully said, "Let's go!"

Birding was Jim's hobby, but Mill Mountain Theatre was Jim's career. He spent more than 30 years with the theatre and many of them as director. After Jim's retirement, mounting debt forced the theatre to close in 2009. A sad time for Jim and all who loved it. At the time of his death, Jim was part of a group working passionately to bring Mill Mountain Theatre back to Roanoke.

A man of many talents, in addition to his work in the theatre and his hobby of bird watching, Jim taught at Monroe Junior High School, Patrick Henry High School and Hollins College (now Hollins University).

Jim was a great friend and a wonderful birding companion. We will miss him.
