

### THE BIRDS & WILDLIFE OF ROCKY KNOB & ROCK CASTLE GORGE

The Rocky Knob Recreation Area provides some of the best birding opportunities in the long stretch of the Blue Ridge Parkway between the Peaks of Otter and Doughton Park. The 3,800 acre recreation area is located along the edge of the Blue Ridge Plateau and extends down into Rock Castle Gorge—named for its unique rock formations of crystalline quartz which resemble the turrets of old castles. The Gorge provides habitat for a variety of mid and low elevation birds including cerulean and Swainson's warbler! Tom will discuss some of the unique habitats found in and around the Rocky Knob area and the birds and other wildlife that call the Gorge home.

Tom has worked for the National Park Service for 30+ years, 23 as a biologist with the Blue Ridge Parkway. His responsibilities at the Blue Ridge include wildlife management and overseeing the Parkway's Agricultural Leasing Program. On any given day Tom can be found knee deep in the muck and mud of an Appalachian bog looking for bog turtles, chasing a bear out of a picnic area, helping a farmer to develop best management practices and doing breeding bird surveys. Tom is an avid birder and photographer. He assists with the Blacksburg Christmas Bird Count and the Virginia Breeding Bird Atlas project. He lives with his wife Kathy and two sons Alex and Zach in Blacksburg, Virginia.

Or 2) bring your photo files (JPG or PDF) on a thumbdrive, CD or memory card to the September meeting. Put the item in an envelope with a note with the same information as option 1. We especially need this so that we can return your device back to you.



The selection process is unbiased. Jack will receive and compile the photo submissions and an independent committee will make the final selection. You can start submitting your photos today using step one or wait until the September meeting. The price of the calendar will remain at \$12 each and a prototype will be at the October and November meetings for pre-orders. ### **September 1st, Saturday, 7PM**

#### **Nighthawk Watch on Bent Mountain**

(Rain date Sunday, September 2nd)

Our club president, Kent Davis (355-6388) is leading our first walk of the birdwatching season to look for migrating Common Nighthawks. We will meet at the Bent Mountain Community Center starting our walk by visiting the boardwalk and paths. Walking is level, but wear waterproof shoes just in case. The group will then carpool to a nearby area to observe the Nighthawks at dusk.

Directions: From the intersection of Brambleton Ave and Electric Rd, take Brambleton Ave (Rt 221) heading South (away from Roanoke) for 11 miles. Brambleton Ave will change names to Bent Mountain Rd. Take a right at Mill Creek Rd and then a right onto Tinsley Lane. The Community Center is at 10148 Tinsley Lane, Bent Mountain VA 24059.

### **September 12th, Wednesday, 8AM**

#### **Second Wednesday Bird Walk at Greenfield**

Join Barry Whitt (309-4353) for a bird walk on the Cherry Blossom Trail at Greenfield. We will walk around Greenfield Lake in search for waterfowl and songbirds. The walk will be mostly flat walking for about 1 mile. Other walking at the property may include the grassy area overlooking the lake or the trail down to the lower pond. Bring your spotting scopes! Some folks may want to visit Ballast Point brewery at 11AM for lunch after the walk. They have a veranda that overlooks the lake.

Directions: Take Exit 150B on I81 and follow signs to Route 220N. Go about 4 miles and take a left at the entrance to the Greenfield Education and Training Center, across from the entrance to Ashley Plantation. Park in the second lot on the right. This trip will be repeated on October 10th.

#### **VSO Trip to Chincoteague**

**Birding at Beaver Pond**

Meet Eunice Hudgins (389-4056) and Linda Cory (580-5214) at the Orange Market at Hanging Rock at 7:30AM to carpool to George and Betsy Barker's "Beaver Pond" in Craig County. Wear sturdy shoes, warm clothes and bring a packed lunch/drink. You can choose to walk around the farm and woods area or do some porch birding overlooking the Barker's many feeders. This property includes a beaver pond, wetland area, open pastures as well as woodland trails. In the past, we have been treated to Rose-breasted Grosbeak a resident albino Red-Tailed Hawk, Snipe and several butterfly species.

Directions: The Hanging Rock Orange Market is at 1823 Thompson Memorial Drive, Roanoke (just off of the I-81 at either Exits 140 or 141).

**FIELD TRIPS REPORTS**

May 6th Little Spring Day - Despite dire predictions of a rainy morning, seven members enjoyed a beautiful day of birding with only a light sprinkle. By the end of lunch, we had a nice list of 50 species. We got some great looks at pewee, brown thrasher, orchard oriole, scarlet tanager, rough-winged and barn swallows, red-eyed vireo, chestnut-sided warbler, parula, prairie warbler, redstart and chat. Birds heard but not seen included great crested flycatcher, common yellowthroat, ovenbird, yellow-throated and white-eyed vireo and grasshopper sparrow.

May 9th 2nd Wednesday at Greenfield - A dozen birders enjoyed a beautiful day with 60 species reported. Highlights were 7 wood ducklings, double-crested cormorants, green herons, 1 Bald Eagle, spotted and solitary sandpiper, hairy woodpecker, willow flycatcher, eastern kingbird, blue-headed and warbling vireo, Louisiana waterthrush, blackpoll, rose-breasted and blue and orchard and Baltimore orioles (on the nest).

May 12th Warbler Road - The annual Warbler Road trip produced 62 species including common merganser, Acadian and great-crested flycatchers, white-eyed, yellow-throated, blue-headed, red-eyed and warbling vireos, raven, veery, wood thrush and, of course, warblers: ovenbird, worm-eating, Louisiana waterthrush, redstart, hooded, cerulean, parula, chestnut-sided, black-throated green and blue.

**May 19th VSO Annual Meeting –**

There were many trips to take and many bird species were seen at this year's meeting in Harrisonburg. The highlight for many was Reddish Knob where red crossbills were seen. At 4,400 foot elevation, it is off of route 924 in Augusta county on the border of Virginia and West Virginia.



**June 9th Mount Rogers and White Top -** 14 club members enjoyed the annual foray to this special birding spot at 4-5,000 foot elevation.

Nesting juncos summer there as well as least flycatchers, a variety of warblers including good looks at a Blackburnian. Although the crossbills were not seen this year, a good time was had by all.

**August 4th Austin's Open House -** A group of 17 enjoyed a beautiful day birding around the Bent Mountain Community Center, Tinsley Lane, Poor Mountain and the Austin property. Seen were ravens, green heron, barred owl, scarlet tanager, Acadian flycatcher, and chestnut-sided warbler. The crowning touch was the 40+ ruby-throated hummingbirds buzzing around their many feeders and flowering plants.

### **Club Outreach**

There are many ways that our club members serve the community regarding ornithology. We have been involved in activities that spread our mission of habitat conservation for birds and/or education on bird watching. Some examples are Maxine Fraade organizing our participation at GoFest and Radical Reels and Mary Harshfield for Earth Day and Spring Fling at Mill Mountain Zoo.

In July, Linda Cory and Ashley Peel lead morning bird walks at FloydFest.

In May, Mary Harshfield and Linda Cory lead 24 elementary students on a walk around the school's forest trail.

In April, Toni Pepin and Linda Cory gave ornithological talks to two different Master Naturalist classes.

Also, Sissy Logan has lead bird walks for local clubs to Harvey's Knob and other locations.

## Big Spring Day

51 birding volunteers from the Lynchburg and Roanoke Valley bird clubs participated in this year's Big Spring Day resulting in 121 species. Highlights were 1 northern bobwhite, 20 turkey, woodcocks, osprey and harrier, bald eagle, screech, great-horned and barred owls, 14 whip-poor-wills, 20 ravens, 1 cliff swallow, winter wren, veery, hermit thrush, early white-throated sparrows and juncos and 20 bobolinks. Since this is higher elevation birding, many warblers were found including: ovenbird, worm-eating warbler, Louisiana and northern waterthrush, black-and-white, Kentucky, common yellowthroat and hooded warblers, redstart, Cape May, cerulean, parula, magnolia, bary-breasted, Blackburnian, yellow, chestnut-sided, black-throated blue and green, palm, pine, yellow-rumped, prairie, Canada, Wilson's warblers and yellow-breasted chat.

## Virginia Breeding Bird Atlas Project

We need your input.

Although you may not have signed up to be a reporter for this project, your observations are still needed. Examples would be seeing baby birds in the nest or fledglings on the ground. These are considered "incidental atlas observations" and are ALL welcomed. Here are the instructions on entering this valuable data. - ✓ Go to the VA Atlas eBird portal at <https://ebird.org/content/atlasva/>
- ✓ Log in with your existing eBird account or create one if you are a first-time eBird user. If you are an existing eBird user, please do not create a new eBird account just for atlasing!
- ✓ Click "Submit Observations" at top.
- ✓ Enter and then select the block or county name in the field under "Find it on a Map".
- ✓ Zoom in as far as possible and precisely plot the point of your observation, giving the location whatever name you wish. Click Continue.
- ✓ Enter the date of observation and select "Incidental" as the observation type, assuming you are reporting only the eagles and not a complete list of other birds seen on the same outing. Click Continue.
- ✓ Enter the number of birds seen (in this case, 2 Bald Eagles) and then click "Add Breeding Code or Details" to choose the correct breeding code (in this case, ON Confirmed – Occupied Nest). Add comments or links to photos in the Details field when available. Click Submit.
- ✓ Review your submission for accuracy and make edits as needed. Otherwise, that's it!
