# DREW'S BIRD OF THE MONTH GREAT CRESTED FLYCATCHER Myiarchus crinitus

 ${\cal A}$  large, assertive flycatcher with rich reddish-brown accents and a lemon-yellow belly, the Great Crested Flycatcher is a common bird of Eastern woodlands. Its habit of hunting high in the canopy means it's not particularly conspicuous—until you learn its very distinctive call, an emphatic rising whistle. These flycatchers swoop after flying insects and may crash into foliage in pursuit of leaf-crawling prey. They are the only Eastern flycatchers that nest in cavities, and this means they sometimes make use of nest boxes.

# RUFFED GROUSE AND AMERICAN WOODCOCK CONSERVATION EFFORTS SPEAKERS: SEAN BARRY AND SARA CERV

**T**his month's program will acquaint us with an organization that undertakes significant conservation efforts aimed at protecting and developing enhanced new habitat for wildlife—specifically Ruffed Grouse and American Woodcock. Representatives from the Ruffed Grouse Society and American Woodcock Society, Sean Barry and Sara Cerv, will highlight their group's work with landowners and government agencies to develop critical wildlife habitat utilizing scientific management practices.

Sean Barry is the Forest Conservation Director for the RGS & AWS in the Southern Appalachian region. Sean oversees a dynamic portfolio of conservation projects, including landscape-scale partnerships with federal and state agencies, private landowners, and other conservation nonprofit organizations. Sean holds a bachelor's degree from Georgetown University and a master's degree in environmental policy and management with a concentration in natural resource management from the University of Denver.

Sara Cerv is the Forest Conservation Director for the RGS & AWS for the Coastal Plain and Piedmont Region. She leads large-scale forest management projects, collaborating with local communities and helping build lasting solutions that address challenges like habitat fragmentation and forest diversification. Originally from Christiansburg, Virginia, Sara earned her Master of Forestry and a certification in Geospatial Information Technologies from Virginia Tech in 2021.

#### Drew's Bird of the Month Great Crested Flycatcher

Myiarchus crinitus

"Preface: The Great Crested Flycatcher is a cavity nester and will use a bird box with a 2-inch hole. Every nest I have ever seen has a shed snake skin in it.

**Status:** Fairly common spring and fall transient and summer resident."

The Great Crested Flycatcher is a bird of the tree tops. It spends very little time on the ground, and does not hop or walk. It prefers to fly from place to place on the ground rather than walk.

These birds live along the edges between habitats; they don't need big stretches of unbroken forest canopy to thrive. That means that logging and development practices that increase forest fragmentation actually work to their advantage, in sharp contrast to birds that dwell deep in the forest.

They weave shed snakeskin into their nest. Where it's readily available, as in Florida, nearly every nest contains snakeskin. They also seem to look for flimsy, crinkly nest materials—they've also used onion skins, cellophane, or plastic wrappers.

Nestlings rarely return to breed near where they were born. But once yearlings have chosen a breeding area, they often return to that same area year after year. Some pairs re-establish their bond from the previous season and may even reuse the same nesting cavity.

Though they're flycatchers, these birds also eat a fair amount of fruit. Instead of picking at the flesh of small fruit, Great Crested Flycatchers swallow the fruit whole and regurgitate the pits, sometimes several at a time.

When the male sings, it's to be heard, not to see or be seen. He picks a singing perch within the canopy, well away from branch ends. In contrast, hunting perches require an unobstructed view of potential prey and unobstructed flight paths to them, whether the prey is in the air or on leaves or twigs. Both sexes favor hunting from dead branches with a backdrop of foliage for cover.

#### **MAY 2025**

- Big Spring Day 2025, Saturday, Coordinator: Barry Kinzie (540-580-0059) Join the effort to count as many of our area birds as possible from Saturday morning through early afternoon. There are specific territories that need to be surveyed, and our coordinator Barry Kinzie can use all of the volunteers that he can enlist to cover them. Please contact Barry if you're interested in getting involved and having fun!
- Tinker Creek Lane, Saturday 8:00 am. Leader: Sissy Logan (540-353-4500) Sissy takes us for a birding hike in a beautiful tract (private property with access authorized by a friend of RVBC) just north of the Tinker Creek. The property is a mix of habitats with large open fields, wooded areas, fence rows, and areas near the creek. Expect spring migrants as well as waterfowl that may be present near the creek. Directions: Travel route 460 and turn onto northbound Plantation Road, then turn right onto Hollins Road eastbound. Turn left onto Old Mountain Road and immediately turn right once you cross the creek onto Tinker Creek Lane. The property is at the very end of the lane.
- May Membership Meeting, Monday 7:00pm. Roanoke Council of Garden Clubs, 3640 Colonial Avenue, Roanoke, VA 24018. See page 2. Program topic: Conservation Efforts Ruffed Grouse and American Woodcock Society– Speakers: Sean Barry and Sara Cerv.
- Second Wednesday Bird Walk, Greenfield 8:00am. Leader: Bill Hunley (540-467-3477) Join us for a Wednesday morning bird walk on the Cherry Blossom Trail at Greenfield. We will walk around Greenfield Lake and possibly to the pond beyond. It will be mostly flat walking for about 1 mile each way. Bring your spotting scope if you have one.
  - **Directions:** Take Exit 150B on 1-81 and follow signs to Route 220N. Go about 4 miles and turn left at the entrance onto International Parkway and the Greenfield Education and Training Center, across from the entrance to Ashley Plantation. Park in the second lot on right.
- Mill Mountain Park on Mill Mountain, Roanoke, 8:00 am. Leader: Linda Cory (540-580-5214) Join leader, Linda Cory for a morning bird walk at the top of Mill Mountain. The park at the peak of the mountain is a beautiful horticultural and avian spot especially in spring.

  Directions: From Jefferson Street in Roanoke City turn onto Southeast bound Walnut Street and follow it as it turns into the parkway circling up to the top of Mill Mountain, turning right at the intersection of Mill Mountain Spur (at the Big 'Ol Bikes sculpture). Park in the lot adjacent to the Discovery Center to meet up with the group.
- Green Hill Park, Salem, Saturday 7:00 am (Note: specific start time.) Leader: Kent Skaggs (308-627-5414)

  Kent Skaggs will lead us on an early morning hike along the paths of Green Hill Park. The park borders the Roanoke River and incorporates wooded habitat around its periphery.
  - **Directions**: From West Main Street, Salem, turn left at Diuguids Road. In less than ½ mile, cross over the Roanoke River, and turn right onto Green Hill Park Road. Park in the first parking lot on right.
- Jae Valley Park Bird Hike, Saturday 8:00 am. Leaders: Kent Davis (540-355-6388) and Kirk Gardner (828-216-9170)

  Join us for a trip to a park area that's under-birded yet very productive. Our Leaders, Kent and Kirk, frequently have birds flocking to them, so don't miss this one!
  - **Directions**: From Roanoke SW take Walnut Ave eastbound across the bridge (across I-581, the railroad, and the Roanoke River) turning left on Piedmont Rd. After one block, turn right onto Riverland Road SE and follow this route southeast until you reach the junction with Bennington Street. Stay to the right and the route turns into Mount Pleasant Boulevard and heads further southeast. This road (Route 116) goes straight and becomes Jae Valley Rd which gets you to the park entrance. Turn right into Jae Valley Park.



### 54<sup>TH</sup> BIG SPRING DAY SATURDAY, MAY 3, 2025 (TIME VARIES)

 ${\mathcal T}$ he 54th annual count is this coming Saturday, May 3rd!

This fun and historic citizen science tradition is a count conducted jointly by the Roanoke Valley Bird Club and the Lynchburg Bird Club. The first Big Spring Day count occurred in 1971 and 102 species were found. Last year, a total of 126 species were observed.


Sixteen groups of birders will cover designated areas within 7.5 miles of the Big Spring in the Peaks of Otter Picnic Area. Each of the sixteen groups will independently choose their starting time, and rain-or-shine continues as long into the day as they desire. As per tradition, a mid-day tally will be held for those interested in sharing the day's findings, and having a chance to chat with fellow enthusiastic birders. This year's tally will be held between 12:30 and 1:30 PM in the amphitheater behind the Peaks of Otter Visitor Center. Restrooms are available, and snacks and cold beverages will be provided.

Never birded on Big Spring Day, or haven't been able to participate in the last few years? Newcomers and birders returning to the volunteer flock are always encouraged and warmly welcomed. Please contact Barry at peckerridge@lumos.net or 540-580-0059, he will match you up with a route or an existing team looking for additional eyes.

Special Note to Big Spring Day group leaders: If you are using eBird mobile in the field, please also share the list(s) with eBird user *bigspringday* before you submit, and the list will go straight into the compiled report. If you don't share in the field, due to an eBird quirk, you can't later share via the app. Instead, you will need to share via the eBird website. Access the eBird.org website on your computer or phone, open the checklist(s), and at right of screen click on blue Checklist Tools, select Share w/ others in your party, then at left in white box type *bigspringday* and then click green Share Checklist below. You should get a message "Yay! This checklist has been shared."

## Field Trip Reports

#### Saturday, April 5, Go Green for Grandin Festival

The Roanoke Valley Bird Club had a booth at the First Annual Go Green Festival at The Raleigh Court Library. Our booth was manned by Mary Harshfield, Marc Arrington, and Drew Daniels. We had a lot of people drop by to talk birds and find out when our next meeting will be. Several people who were new to the area stopped by to find out what we do and how to join up, very encouraging. There were lots of young families who brought their children by to see the Backyard Birds poster, and identify what birds they had in their yards. It was a successful day.



Wednesday, April 9, Mid-Week Wednesday Bird Walk at Oak Grove Park. Leader Drew Daniels. After the preceding week of temperatures in the upper 70's to low 80's, we started out with temps in the low 40's, and 10 hardy souls came to bird, and bird we did. We totaled 28 species with some notables: a Winter Wren, Northern House Wren, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Hermit Thrush and a plethora of White-Throated Sparrows. The trail was excellent and has been extended making easy access to the birds. It was certainly worth a visit.



#### Saturday, April 12, Vineyard Park Bird Walk in Vinton

Leaders Kent Davis and Drew Daniels. Nine bundled-up birders braved the early morning temperatures, a constant breeze, and slowly clearing skies at Vineyard Park in Vinton. After a healthy walk along the creek and around the soccer fields, we identified 40 species. Included in our finds were several Warbler species - Yellow-rump, Palm, and Common Yellowthroats. Being just across the tracks from the Great Blue Heron Rookery, we saw 8 Great Blue Herons; some were carrying sticks for their nests. We saw a Northern Flicker and Downy, Hairy, and Red-bellied Woodpeckers. In addition, we saw Blue-gray Gnatcatchers, Ruby-crowned Kinglets, Tree Swallows, and White-bellied Nuthatches. A very rewarding day, but we were glad to get in our cars to warm up!
